

Descendants of Joseph Kinkaid

Generation No. 1

1. JOSEPH¹ KINKAID was born Abt. 1771 in , , Maryland, and died September 22, 1840 in English, Crawford county, IN. He married ELIZABETH DOWNING Bet. 1793 - 1798 in Indiana¹, daughter of BENJAMIN DOWNING and SARAH GREY. She was born 1776 in Frederick county?, MD, and died Abt. 1850 in Crawford county, IN.

Notes for JOSEPH KINKAID:

Notes from Carol Anglen:

In creating all Kinkaid sketches I relied primarily on "Our Kinkaid Ancestry", by Smith and Satzler, both of whom were descendants of Joseph Kinkaid's son, Andrew, and his first wife.

The name Kinkaid is spelled various ways and in early documents may be seen as Kincade, Kincaid, Kinkade and Kinkaid. Our branch of the family maintains the Kinkaid spelling. It is also said by some researchers that the parents of our Joseph Kinkaid were David Kinkaid and Winnifred Hobson. This is not documented by me. Although we are uncertain where Joseph Kinkaid was born, it is suspected in Maryland, and the same goes for his wife, Elizabeth. Joseph and Elizabeth's marriage is also undocumented.

Joseph and Elizabeth in Kentucky

In 1797 the Kentucky Legislature ruled that any person could purchase land south of the Green River. Previously, this land had been reserved for Revolutionary soldiers. By 1798 the law was further amended so that a head of house could settle and claim 200 acres if two acres had been cleared, fenced, and tended in corn.

Joseph Kinkaid and his father-in-law, Benjamin Downing's brother, Samuel, applied for land under the new law. The land was on Greasy Creek in what was then Mason county, and is today Green county. (This parcel of land is north of Holland, Kentucky, where Joseph's in-laws, the Downings, were buried.) The certificate numbers for Samuel Downing and Joseph Kinkaid were No.1113 and No.1114.

Certificate No.1114, dated September 11, 1798, Green County, Kentucky reads: "We do hereby certify that Joseph Kincade is entitled to 200 acres of second rate land by Virtue of his having improved the same agreeably to an act of the Assembly Entitled, 'An act for encouraging & granting relief to Settlerz' and listed as follows On the waters of Greasy Creek Beginning at Silas Burk's corner that standz on John Harvey's Military line runing thence with said Burks line N39 & E179 poles to a Chesnut & Double dogwood thence N57 & W179 poles to a Dogwood & 3 white Oak treez thence S39 W179 poles to 2 Dogwoods, beech & Gum treez, thence to the beginning the Improvement is near the South West Side." (see JK#1)

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Joseph Kinkaid Writes A Will

Sometime between 1798 and 1840, Joseph left Kentucky and arrived in Crawford County, Indiana, where on April 28, 1840, our ancestor, Joseph Kinkaid, wrote his will, as follows. (See JK#2).

In The Name of God Amen

I Joseph Kinkaid of Crawford county and State of Indiana being weak in body - but of sound and perfect mind and memory, blessed be almighty God for the same do make and publish this my last will and testament in manner and form following that is to say first I give and bequeath unto my beloved wife, Elizabeth the power and authority of selecting such articles of property as may suit her for her own proper use and benefit

I further declare in this my will and testament that after the above selection is made that are both personal and real estate shall be valued by disinterested men and the land whereon I now live my sons, Andrew, James and John at their option may take and hold the same at its valuation other wise to be sold as other property and if they so take it at is valuation the boys to retake each an heirs' part of the proceeds of the same, the ballance to be distributed equally among my lawful heirs and further the personal property to be sold and an equally division to be made among the lawful heirs

I further declare that my sons Joseph's three liitle boys come in as an heir and to draw an equal part when the become of age it is further my wish that my sons Andrew and James to serve and sit as administrators of this my last will and further request them to keep and retain the part that falls to my son Josephs little boys and the same to be put on lawful interest untill they become of age.

I further declare that Stephen Easley shall entirely be debarred from drawing more than dollar or as little as the law will allow him. I hereby declare this to be my last will and testament in witness whereof I hereunto set my hand and seal the 28th day of April in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and forty.

This seems to be a pretty straightforward will except near the end where he states, that his son-in-law, Stephen Easley, be "debarred from drawing more than a dollar or as little as the law allows". We can look at this comment in two ways. A family rift - or else Stephen and Mary, his wife, may have already received their share in some other manner. We don't know but it sure does make us wonder...

Joseph's Will Probated

Joseph may have been ill at the writing of his will as only five months later he was

deceased and his will was in probate court. There is no known place of burial for Joseph, but it is thought by Satzler and Smith that both he and his wife are probably buried in Sloan Cemetery in English, Indiana.

We visited this cemetery in 1989 and there were no stones for either of them there, but there were many stones down and parts of some stones had been tossed into the woods nearby. It would be a shame, but we may never know the burial place of these grandparents. There is a chance that they were not buried in Sloan cemetery, but on personal property somewhere.

LANDERS Bet. 1825 - 1828 in IN. She was born 1809 in , , North Carolina, and died January 07, 1903 in Rantoul, Franklin Co., Kansas.

Notes for MINISTER ANDREW KINKAID:

We don't have much evidence for the birth of Andrew, but his son, Eli T.'s, states in his history that Andrew died at the age of 55. The date of Andrew's probated will was 1848, so that makes his birth around 1793. His parents moved to Kentucky when he was a young boy.

Andrew Kinkaid Becomes
Kentucky Landowner

From "Crawford County History, 1818-1926", by H.H. Pleasant

"In 1814 the following men bought farms in Crawford county; Andrew Kinkaid, ___ Totten, ___ Fulleneider, ___ McKay, Moses Smith, and Robert Fields." --

Andrew would have been about 19-20 years old

Andrew Kinkaid and Barbery Landis

On August 20, 1817, John Glenn "joined together in the Holy State of Matrimony Andrew Kinkade & Barbery Landis" in Orange county, Indiana. The handwriting on this marriage document is pretty bad and her surname looks like Landis, but might also be read as Lander. This record is found in Marriage Book 1, p.22, Orange County Circuit Court. (AK#1 my files)

After 1825, Barbery (Landis?) Kinkaid died following the birth of their fourth child. During this time he was in charge of roads from A. Sloan's to the Three Forks of the Little Blue River and was also a seminary trustee and Justice of the Peace.

Andrew Kinkaid and Elizabeth Landers

Andrew, left with four little ones under the age of seven after the death of Barbery, needed a wife to carry on the multiple duties of taking care of a home on the frontier and although we have no marriage record, it must ahve been about 1827 when he married Elizabeth Landers. (If his wives' surname is the same, then it is likely that Barbery and Elizabeth were sisters.)

Elizabeth, took on Barbery's four children and she added 11 more children to the family in the next 16 years. This brought the total children in the family to 15. Elizabeth (Landers) Kinkaid's, birth (c.1808) is calculated from her tombstone which reads "Died Jan. 7, 1903 Aged 95 Years". (See above comments re maiden name -- Landiss or Landers.)

The Log Cabin Church

The two Kinkaid's, Joseph and his son, Andrew, helped organize a Sunday School class at the Three Forks of the Little Blue about 1819. They lived in a one room log cabin from which they conducted the class of 13 members. Later a log cabin was built and called Blue River Meeting House. David M. Stewart organized the church in October 1819. This church eventually became the English Christian Church which has the distinction of being

the third oldest Christian Church in Indiana. The present building is the third the congregation has used since its meetings in the Kinkaid cabin. The church celebrated its 160th anniversary in 1979.

From Indiana to Missouri

In 1841, the Andrew Kinkaid family which numbered at least seven children had moved from Indiana to Cass county, Missouri, settling among the Indians. Here he bought 240 acres of land. Andrew farmed and preached and maintained his Republican principles and was against slavery.

Death of Andrew Kinkaid - 1848

Andrew Kinkaid supposedly died at the age of 55 and before October 1848. At his death he left his widow, Elizabeth, with 10 children under 20 years of age, with twins about three years old. Widow Elizabeth never remarried.

Andrew's Estate Probated

On October 28th, 1848, Elizabeth Kinkaid and son-in-law, Henry Shively, appeared before the court of Cass county, Missouri, as executors of the estate of Andrew Kinkaid, deceased. (AK#2)

Executor's report

Received of Henry Shively and Elizabeth Kincaid executor and executrix of the estate of Andrew Kincaid, deceased - Fifty four dollars and fifty tow (sic) cents in full of the amount which was in the hands of said Andrew Kincaid at his death belonging to the three heirs of Joseph Kincaid, Jr. according to the will of Joseph Kincaid (segnior) of which will said Andrew Kincaid and myself are executors said will directing that said (Three) heirs of Joseph Kincaid Jr should have (segnior), and that said share should be returned by said Andrew Kincaid and myself untill said three children of Joseph Kincaid, Jr. come of age and as said Andrew Kincaid has died and the three children of Joseph not yet being of age the said share has therefore fallen into the hands of myself surviving? executor of the said Joseph Kincaid (segnior) and the amount due said three children of Joseph Kincaid, Jr I hereby acknowledge to be in my hands both principal and interest and I hereby fully release the estate of Andrew Kincaid from all liability on account of the share of said children of Joseph Kincaid Jr - given under my hand and seal this date above... James D. Kinkaid {seal}

At first, the reading of this probate record looks a little confusing, but when you know the circumstances it becomes clearer. When Andrew's father, Joseph, died eight years before, he left an heirs' portion into the joint keeping of sons, Andrew and James, for the children of his already deceased son, Joseph, until the minor children reached their majority. When Andrew died he was still one of the keepers of the children's portion, hence we see the surviving son, James Kinkaid, in court receiving sole custody of the \$52.52, the children's share..

It is thought that Andrew Kinkaid is buried in Freeman cemetery, Dolan township, Cass county, near Harrisonville, Missouri, where Elizabeth remained for several more years.

Notes for ELIZABETH LANDERS:

In the 1850 census, widow Elizabeth was 43, living with her ten children, ranging in age from 22 to 5 year old twins. She has been a widow for about two years. Henry is 22, James R. is 21. It is supposed that these adult sons are helping with her support. The 1860 census finds her still residing near Morristown in Cass county. Elizabeth was 51, living with her son, Eli 21, and the 15 year old twins, Andrew and Elizabeth. Her real value is \$1800. All the rest of the children have left the nest.

Elizabeth Kinkaid -- In Kansas

Sometime between 1860 and the 1865 census Elizabeth moved to Peoria, Franklin county, Kansas, where she was living with her son, Benjamin D. Kinkaid, and his new wife Elizabeth Rice. Also with them is surviving twin, Elizabeth, 20. Andrew (the twin of Elizabeth) died at age 18 of wounds received in the Civil War. She made several moves in the next few years.

1870 found Elizabeth, 62, near Buffalo, in Clifton township, Wilson county, Kansas, with her son, John S. Kinkaid¹ and his wife, Caroline (Frazier) Kinkaid and their seven children. Elizabeth was now 62.

In 1880 Elizabeth had reached the age of 71 and was still living with John S. and family in Wilson county. John S. and his wife now have 10 children, as well as grandma Elizabeth, all in one house. However, in 1883 John S. Kinkaid moved to Idaho Territory settling near Grangeville, so Elizabeth moved in with another child.

In 1885 she was found in Cutler-Peoria township of Franklin county, Kansas, living with her daughter and son-in-law, William and Lively Jane Springer and their 8 children ranging in age from 33 to 15. Grandma Elizabeth was 76.

In the census of 1900 Elizabeth had reached age 91 and still lived with her now widowed daughter, Lively Jane Springer, 69, and a grandson Calvin Springer.

Elizabeth Kinkaid Dies at Age 95

On January 7, 1903, Elizabeth (Landers) Kinkaid died at the age of 95. She was buried in the Shively Cemetery on the farm of her daughter, Mary (Polly) Shively, near Rantoul, Kansas.

Notes for ANDREW MARION (TWIN) KINKAID:

Marion Andrew enlisted in the Civil War in Co. D., 12th Kansas Infantry, and was wounded at the battle of Pea Ridge. Wounded, he was returned home, where he died from his wounds in Rantoul, Franklin county, Kansas. He was about eighteen years old.

Notes for JOSEPH KINKAID:

Joseph Kinkaid, Jr. died just two days before the birth of his third son, also named Joseph. He was only 26 when he died. One wonders why he died at such a young age.

Notes for JOSEPH KINKAID:

He was born just two days after his father's death in May of 1837. In 1842, Sarah, his widowed mother went to Wapello, Iowa, where she died in 1846, when Joseph was only 9. Sarah's sister, Jane (Glenn) French and was raised as a family member. From "Gone to Glory" by Mary Eva French Davis this quote: "He was the same as a brother to my father and we always called him Uncle Joe. The same year that Sarah died Jane and her husband, Samuel French (who was a minister) took him to Dewitt county, Illinois. In 1850 they moved to Springfield, Illinois, and in 1853 he joined the trek back to Iowa, locating in Clarke county, near Osceola. In 1858 he went to Kansas and freighted across the plains. He lived for a time in Franklin county with an uncle on his father's side.

"When the war broke out, he enlisted in Co. D, 1st Kansas Inf., at Ft. Leavenworth, Kansas, June 3, 1861. He fought in the famous battle of Wilson Creek, a short distance from Springfield, Missouri. The 1st Iowa Regiment and a Missouri Regiment were also in this battle. Union soldiers numbered 5500 - rebels 23,000. (This from Historical data.) He as mustered out of the service at Ft. Leavenworth, Jun 16, 1864.

"Some time later he and his cousin, Ben Kinkaid bought land in Leavenworth County, near Ackerland, where they owned a saw mill. He and Ben later divided the land and in 1883 he bought 40 acres and a second 40 in 1889."

Joseph and Orilla had no children but reared a nephew of hers, Joseph Sample, who was born Aug 28, 1889, near Humansville, Missouri. On September 14, 1911, he married Rosa Minnie Hitzeman. They had Leroy Sample in 1913, who married Agnes Brune and Joseph Barnard Sample, born 1921 who married Helen Williams.

4. HENRY M. G.³ KINKAID (ANDREW², JOSEPH¹) was born January 24, 1828 in IN, and died June 15, 1895 in Riley, KS.

Notes for HENRY M. G. KINKAID:

"HENRY M.G. KINKAID is the owner and occupant of a carefully and intelligently managed, and well-improved farm in Grant Township, Riley county and is personally one of the most genial, companionable, and intelligent men in this vicinity. His farm comprises only forty acres, but affords a comfortable home with many attractive features. Mr. Kinkaid was born

in Greenbrier County, Ky., Jan. 24, 1828. (For parental and family history see sketch of Eli T. Kinkaid)

"He of whom we write was living in Morristown, Cass county, Mo, when the Civil War broke out, and being a Republican nad a Union man suffered on account of his principles. The Confederates sought to force him to join their ranks and take up arms in the cause of the South, but he refused to do so. Finding opposition unavailing except to endanger his property and life, he crossed into Kansas, and on Sept 8, 1861, he took up arms in defense of the Union, becoming a member of Company G, 14th Kansas Infantry. He served but fifteen days in that command, being granted unlimited furlough to enable him to get his family out of Missouri, they being in danger therein. Stealing through the Confederate pickets by night he reached Cass County, and succeeded at great risk and after much effort in getting his family across to this State, and collecting together remnants of his property.

"Coming at once to Riley county, Mr. Kinkaid, took up a claim on section 28, in the bend of Blue River, the land being located about one mile north of the present village of Stockdale, and consisting of the fractional lots 4 and 5, which comprised seventy-nine and fourteen one hundredths acres. A year or two ago he purchased forty acres adjoining it on the west, where he is now residing.

"At Rose Hill, Cass Co., Mo., Jan 5, 1854, Mr. Kinkaid was united in marriage with Miss Susan Davenport, a lady whose noble nature and Christian virtues entitled her to high regard and who has been her husband's comfort and home counselor since their union. She is the daughter of Perry and Mary Davenport, and was born in Virginia, as were her parents and grandparents. To Mr. and Mrs. Kinkaid three children have been born. John A.T. died at the age of six years; Mary J.E. is the wife of Joshua Wilkinson, a farmer in Clay county, Kan., and is the mother of five living children: Sarah married Joseph E. Hussey, who also lives in Clay county, their family comprising two children.

"Mr. Kinkaid was for many years a Republican, but has recently been identified with the Union Labor party. He has served as Road Overseer for eight years, and his fitness for that position is proven by his continuance in the office. His wife belongs to the Baptist Church and heto the Christian Church. His industry, morality and genial nature are well-know, and he enjoys the respect and good will of a large circle of acquaintances.

"Another page of this volume presents a lithographic portrait of Mr. Kinkaid, which will be recognized with pleasure by those who have read his history, and especially by his personal friends."

Notes for FRANCES KINKAID:

Known as "Frankie" in the immediate family, her name is seen occasionally as Anna Frances (which name I used in the beginning) but in all legal records she is named as only Frances. She probably did have a second name and it may have been Anna, but I don't think I have any legal documents using that name. She and her husband, Zephaniah, were not compatible in marriage and they lived apart for many years. In 1920 she is alone.

"JOHN S. KINKAID, one of the highly respected farmers of Camas prairie, was born in Indiana, September 9, 1833, and is a representative of an old Kentucky family. His grandfather, Joseph Kinkaid, was a soldier of the War of 1812, and was an early settler of Kentucky. His son, Andrew Kinkaid, was born, reared and educated in Kentucky and became a minister of the Christian church. In 1841 he removed to Missouri and was a prominent preacher of the gospel in that state. He married Miss Elizabeth Landis, a native of Tennessee, who is still living and has celebrated her ninetieth birthday, her home being with a daughter in Kansas. The father died in the fifty-fifth year of his age, but his memory remains as a blessed benediction to all who knew him. Two of the sons loyally served their country in the Union army during the Civil War, and one of them lost his life in the great

struggle to maintain the Union. In the family were seven children, five of whom yet survive.

"Rev. John S. Kinkaid was educated in Cass county, Missouri, in a little log schoolhouse such as was common at that time. In his early youth he had accompanied his parents from Indiana to that state, and in 1861 went with them to Kansas, locating in Franklin county. He had been married, however, in Missouri, in 1859, to Miss Caroline Frazier, and they made their home upon a farm in Kansas from 1861 until 1883, when they came to Camas prairie and took a tract of land, whereon Mr. Kinkaid has since engaged in stock-raising, making a specialty of graded Durham cattle and graded Percheron horses. He has one hundred and fourteen acres of land and a most hospitable home, the latch-string always being out to those who come this way.

"Unto Mr. and Mrs. Kinkaid have been born ten children, all of whom reached years of maturity, while four sons and four daughters are yet living, namely: Denver, who is engaged in farming near his father; Ulysses S., who is engaged in the butchering business at Elk City; Annie, wife of William Perkins; Alice, wife of Robert Farris; Marion and William, who follow farming; Maude, who is engaged in 'school teaching; and Myrtle, wife of Charles Jacobsen. The parents are valued members of the Christian church, in which Elder Kinkaid is an ordained minister. He is a man of broad humanitarian principles, a faithful follower of the Teacher of Nazareth, and gladly embraces every opportunity of proclaiming the gospel of peace on earth, good will to men. His political support is given the Republican party. His noble life is unclouded by shadow of wrong or suspicion of evil, and all who know him have for him the kindest regard."

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WHAT IS THAT MIDDLE INITIAL FOR?

At first I wondered if John S. Kinkaid's middle initial was Shively, since his family back in Missouri married into that family, but his family descendants in Oregon have a document in which they are certain his middle name reads Snively (with an N).

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'DADDY' KINKAID'

In Idaho county, Idaho, he was called "Daddy" Kinkaid and in a local history book Idaho County Voices his picture is even captioned with that name. From Idaho county histories it seems that he was always a'preaching.

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A BURYIN' PARSON

A picture of John S. Kinkaid giving burial rites to an individual in the Idaho county area can be seen in a local history "Pioneer Days in Idaho County", by Sister Alfreda Elsensohn. The deceased is just a blanket shrouded body. Sadly, the picture is not dated, the place is not identified, nor is the name of the deceased person given.

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A KINKAID TEENAGER THE FIRST BURIAL IN FAIRVIEW CEMETERY

One interesting story was related to me by Dennis Long, a descendant of Fairview pioneers. Fairview, the area in which the Kinkaid's lived, was sparsely settled and up until 1886 there hadn't been a need for a graveyard. A member of the Long family (neighbors

of the Kinkaid's) had a young child sick with typhoid fever and not expected to live. Knowing that death was imminent the land for a burial area was provided and the neighbor men went out to mark out boundaries. Before it was known what the illness was thirteen year old Ida W. Kinkaid had been called on to baby-sit the child. Ida went back to her home and it was not long before she came down with the dreaded typhoid fever herself and died. So, young Ida Kinkaid was the first to be buried in the Fairview cemetery. The irony of it all is that the child of the Long family got well and survived.

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ALL KINKAIDS LEAVE IDAHO COUNTY EXCEPT BUD

John S. Kinkaid and his children had all settled nicely in Idaho county before the turn of the century, but by the mid teens they had nearly all moved away. After his wife died, John, himself, moved to Kennewick, Washington, to live with his son, Marion and family.

FUNERAL SERVICES HELD FOR J. S. KINKAID

Services Held Friday for Pioneer Christian Minister

Funeral services for John S. Kinkaid, pioneer Christian minister of Idaho County, were held Friday from Maugg parlors in Orangeville, the Rev. J.A. Pine pastor of the local Christian church officiating. The following obituary was prepared by the Rev. Mr. Pine:

John S. Kinkaid was born near Indianapolis, Indiana, September 9, 1832. In 1858, he went to Cass county, Missouri, where during the same year he married Miss Caroline Frazier. During the Civil War the couple moved to Kansas. In 1883 they, with some friends, crossed the plains in a wagon, settling in the Fairview neighborhood in Idaho county, in August of the same year. Brother Kinkaid accepted Christ at Buffalo, Kansas, under the ministry of John Randall. He was a successful superintendent of the Sunday School for a number of years in that state. A Sunday School was soon started in Idaho under his leadership, one of the first in Idaho county.

Shortly after this time, Brother Kinkaid began his ministry as the pioneer Christian minister of Central Idaho, at the earnest solicitation of his friend Boyd Teeters, who crossed the plains with him. The warm hearted zeal, his transparent honesty of purpose, his purity of speech and life, his simple trusting faith in Christ, his kindly spirit and loving good will made him a benediction to the pioneer community. On the back of "Old Kate" his faithful saddle horse, he kept his appointments, often riding in inclement weather and ill health over long and tedious mountain roads preaching the gospel "as best as he could" as he would always say. Brother Kinkaid was not an educated man in the modern sense, not having had opportunity to prepare himself for such an important work. But necessity was laid upon him. There was no one else. He used to often say, "I had to preach, I

couldn't let the cause of Christ suffer." His name and memory will long be held in affection and respect by those who were blessed by his ministry. He and his horse will ever be linked with the history of the Christian church in northern Idaho. The pioneer churches at Fairview, at Red Rock, (afterwards moved to Winona) and Clearwater were organized under his ministry. Nearly one hundred persons were led to Christ.

His faithful and good wife passed to her reward in 1903. Eleven children were born to these people. Baby Benny died in infancy, two daughters, Ida and Gracie, each died at the age of 19. The living are: D.T. Kinkaid and Mrs. W.D.Perkins of Clarkston; Mrs. C.S. Jacobson, Spokane; Mrs. Miles Reed, Pocatello; W.H. Kinkaid, Vaughn, Wa.; M.S. Kinkaid, Kennewick, Wa; U.G. Kinkaid, Elk City; and Mrs. R.H. Farris, Clearwater.

J.S. Kinkaid, affectionately called "Daddy" Kinkaid among a wide circle of friends, passed quickly and quietly to his great reward from the home of his son near Kennewick, Wa., on November 10, 1918, at the ripe age of 86 years, two months and one day. He simply "fell asleep" without warning or sickness, as he had wished. We laid him to rest beside his wife and children in Fairview cemetery, near Grangeville. His face literally wreathed in smiles he waits the call of his Lord in the morning of the resurrection. A noble life, pure and clean as a shining example of faithful Christian service has ended. How many thousands more might have done as well!

Mr. Kinkaid and eight children survive the mother, most of whom are residents of this county. They are U.G., William, Marion and D.T. Kinkaid, Mrs. Myrtle Jacobsen, Spokane; Mrs. R.H. Farris, Clearwater; Mrs. William Perkins of Fairview and Mrs. Maude Reed of Moscow.

Ulysses G. "Bud" Kinkaid migrated from Buffalo, Kansas, with his parents. By 1883 they were in Idaho Territory.

Bud Kinkaid first married, in 1885, Nettie Fenn, from whom he must have been divorced, although I have not proven this. (Nettie Kinkaid married George L. Hansen in November 1900) (Kinkaid-Fenn Marriage Marr. Bk 1, p.35)

In 1887, he was listed in the Idaho County Free Press as one of the Petit Jurors for that year. In 1892, he is reported as living in Glenwood, from where he came to "settle for his paper".

Bud Kinkaid's second marriage in 1900 was a family affair. He was married by his father, J.S. Kinkaid at the home of his brother, William H. Kinkaid. His new bride was Minnie Patterson and both of them were residents of Elk City at the time of marriage. (See Marr. Record Bk 2, p.134)

In April of 1901, he bought a lot and house in Elk City, on "East side of Main Street" in the south part of town, south of H.D. Poyneer residence. He paid \$80 in "gold coin". (See Deed Bk 15, p.151, Idaho County)

In 1903, in Elk City, Bud was Proprietor of the Pioneer Livery Stable. On October 10, 1905, Idaho county court records show that Bud (U.G.) Kinkaid was bonded for \$500 as Constable of Elk City. (See Bond Bk 2, p.346, Idaho county, Idaho)

In 2000, you can find a picture of Bud and Minnie Kinkaid, along with many Idaho county pioneers, placed in the large folders of pictures in the hallway of the Idaho County Courthouse.

U.G. Kinkaid, 74, a native of Missouri, was laid to rest in the Fairview Cemetery last Friday following services at Ailor Mortuary. Rev. S.A. Walker officiated. Mr. Kinkaid passed away the Monday prior at his home in Elk City, death being due to a stroke.

Mr. Kinkaid came to Spokane when but a young man, and learning there of the possibilities of the central Idaho region, moved to Idaho county and then on to Elk where he resided for almost 50 years.

Surviving are his widow, four sisters, Mrs. R.H. Farris, Clearwater; Mrs. Anna Perkins and Mrs. Ora M. Reed, both of Clarkston; and Mrs. C.S. Jackson of Spokane; three brothers; D.T. Kinkaid of Clarkston; M.S. Kinkaid, Kennewick; and W.H. Kinkaid of Vaughn, Washington, and several neices and nephews.

Sad Death of Miss Grace Kinkaid, Fairview Precinct

At an early hour on the morning of Saturday, September 25, 1897, Miss Grace Kinkaid departed this life after a three week sickness of typhoid fever at the age of 18 years. Miss Grace was well and widely known in this community, her parents being pioneer settlers here, and her many amiable virtues and lovable disposition had endeared her to all with whom she came in contact. Last winter she resided in Grangeville with the family of Henry S. Jones and attended school. Prior to the fatal attack she was preparing to attend the university at Moscow and was looking forward with great eagerness to the courses of study which she had outlined at that institution to fit herself for a useful career in life. The funeral was set for Monday last, but owing to the nonarrival of her brothers from Dixie, was postponed until Tuesday, when a large concourse of friends from Grangeville and surrounding country assembled to pay the sad last rites to their young friend unkindly snatched away by the cruel hand of death just as the door was opening for her entrance into a life of promise and usefulness. To the stricken parents and relatives we extend the heartfelt sympathy of the community.

Notes for ELI T. KINKAID:

"ELI T. KINKAID - The personal appearance of the subject of this notice would attract attention anywhere, he being of fine stature, nearly six feet high, and a remarkably pleasant countenance. He is a man well informed and intelligent, an energetic talker, full of army yarns and reminiscence, amply able to recite a narrative of the thrilling scenes through which he has passed times gone by. He is a man popular with his neighbors, generous, whole souled and one always willing to render a favor. He owns and occupies a finely-cultivated farm, embellished with a commodious two-story stone residence and other necessary buildings, situated at the foot of the bluffs which border the north side of the Kansas River Valley, within a half mile of Eureka Lake.

"So far as book learning is concerned Mr. Kinkaid's advantages in his youth were quite

limited, but he has kept his eyes open to what is going on around him in the world, and has had a practical experience of a varied character, which has conspired to make him a well informed man and one more than ordinarily intelligent. His domestic affairs are presided over by a very intelligent and amiable lady, who is at once recognized as possessing refined and cultivated tastes and who is in all respects the equal of her husband.

"Mr Kinkaid is a man of fifty-two years, having been born October 2, 1837 in Springtown, Crawford county, Indiana. His parents were Andrew and Elizabeth (Landers) Kinkaid, the former born near Bowling Green, Kentucky and of Scotch descent and the latter a native of Middle Tennessee. Andrew Kinkaid followed farming and almost from boyhood officiated as a minister of the Christian Church. He died in Morristown, Cass County, Missouri, about 1850 at the age of 55. The mother is living with her daughter, Mrs. W.D. Springer, of Franklin County, this state, fourteen miles southeast of Ottawa.

"There were born to the parents of Mr. Kinkaid a family of eleven children, the eldest of whom, Henry M.G., has been a resident of Kansas since 1861, and is now a leading stockdealer of Riley county. He married Miss Susan Davenport and is the father of two children. James Richard died in Cass county, Mo., unmarried, at the age of twenty-six years; Lively J. is the wife of W.D. Springer, a prominent farmer of Franklin county, and they have eight children; John S. married Miss Callie Frazier, is the father of twelve children and lives at Mt. Idaho, Territory; Clement married Lizzie Wells and is farming in Cherokee county, this state, of which he has been a resident since 1854; he is the father of seven children. Benjamin, who has been a resident of Leavenworth county since 1855, married Miss Lizzie Rice and is the father of six children; Cynthia died in Cass county, Mo., when a maiden of seventeen years; Newland died in that county when four years old; Marion during the late Civil War enlisted in Company D, 12th Kansas Infantry, and was wounded at the battle of Pea Ridge, from the effects of which he died after reaching home in Rantoul, Franklin county, Kan., at the age of about eighteen years; Elizabeth is the wife of D.C. Moreland, a farmer of Eskridge, Wabaunsee county, and they have ten children.

"When the subject of this sketch was about three years old, his parents in 1840 removed from Indiana to Cass county, Mo., and settled among the Indians. The father purchased 240 acres of land and followed farming and preaching combined, maintaining his Republican principles in a hot pro-slavery neighborhood. Eli T. spent his boyhood under the home roof until fifteen years old, then in 1854 entered the employ of Yeager, Hays, and Bryant & Co., and commenced freighting across the plains, driving teams to and fro from Santa Fe and New Mexico. Later he engaged in herding cattle and putting up feed for winter in Kansas in 1854. He next went with a wagon train to Albuquerque and subsequently made a trip to Ft. Laramie. He was about eighty miles south of that fort in October, 1855, when Gen. Harney had an encounter with the Sioux Indians, in which he exterminated 180 of them and took eighty-two prisoners, including two squaws and a number of children. Mr. Kinkaid and several of his trainmen assisted in the fight.

"In 1854, Mr. Kinkaid coming to Franklin county, this state, took up 160 acres of land two

miles east of the present city of Baldwin and began breaking with two teams, comprising five yoke of oxen each. He thus operated two years, and then he lost his claim, another party jumping it because young Kinkaid was underage. The jumper sold it to a speculator and then skipped for the East; so Mr. Kinkaid could obtain no redress. After that he broke prairie for other parties until after the outbreak of the Civil War.

"In 1861 Mr. Kinkaid enlisted as a Union soldier in Company D, 1st Kansas Infantry, and participated in some of the most important battles of the war, opening at Wilson's Creek, Mo. He was in the last day's battle of Shiloh and at the sieges of Corinth and Vicksburg, also at the battle of Tallahatchie, Miss. Finally his health failed and he was reduced in weight to ninety pounds. He was obliged to accept his honorable discharge, and was mustered out at Ft. Leavenworth in July 1864. Then returning to Franklin County, he rented a farm upon which he operated until 1867. That year he removed to Leavenworth county, and purchased eighty acres of wild land upon which he lived two years. Then selling out he purchased 160 acres in the same county, which he occupied one year. He left Leavenworth county in 1880 moving to the vicinity of Carbondale, where he farmed three years, and in 1883 changed his residence to Riley county. He now purchased 272 acres of land on section 27 in Manhattan township east of Eureka lake, where he has one of the best improved homesteads in this region.

"In August 1864, at the city of Lawrence, our subject was united in marriage with Miss Eliza A. Wiles, a native of Illinois. Two children have been born in this union, Oscar E. and Edwin E., who are unmarried and remain at home with their parents. Mr. Kinkaid politically is a sound Republican, active in councils of his party and is frequently sent as a delegate to the county conventions. Socially he belongs to the Post No. 100 G.A.R., at Manhattan. He was personally acquainted with John Brown at Ossawatimie, living for three years within a quarter mile of him in Franklin county. He was in full sympathy with old hero, joining his band, and was under him at Ossawatimie. He was also with James Montgomery and Jim Lane, when the latter scattered the border ruffians from a building in which they had gathered, by setting fire to a wagon-load of hay and running it against the building. Mr. Kinkaid with five other men was at Ossawatimie when 300 Missourians made a raid on the place, and assisted in holding the latter at bay for four hours, they being ignorant of the small number of defenders.

"During his boyhood days Mr. Kinkaid knew the notorious guerilla, Bill Quantrell, and played with him during the early years of each in Franklin county. Quantrell was a horse thief before he became a rebel; and a criminal before he became a guerilla. He was not a rebel from the principle but from policy. He was reared in Kansas and made it the scene of murder and rapine in the name of a cause he never sincerely espoused.

"Mr. Kinkaid in 1880 had the honor of felling the largest tree in Riley county, an elm near his home, measuring seven feet across the stump and being twenty-one feet in circumference.

James Kinkaid died at 1 o'clock Monday afternoon. Mr. Kinkaid suffered a stroke of paralysis July 4th, and never regained consciousness. He had been in good health prior to the stroke of paralysis.

Mr. Kinkaid has lived in Caldwell for a great many years. He was one of the early settlers in the Boise valley. He was between 83 and 84 years of age. Last spring his brother, William Kinkaid, while serving as a juror, and as he was leaving the court house, was struck by an automobile and killed.

Mr. Kinkaid was a highly respected man. He was known far and wide for kindness of heart and honesty of soul. He was a man of the strictest integrity in every transaction of life.

A son and daughter summoned from Montana arrived before Mr. Kinkaid's death occurred. Joe Kinkaid, a son whose home is in Caldwell, had not been located Monday evening. A short time ago he went to Nampa to work, but was found to have left there without having sent word to his relatives as to his destination.

James Kinkaid was a veteran of the Civil War, serving in Co. A, 40th Iowa Infantry from 1861 to 1865. His wife was Nancy.

-- Funeral of Kinkaid Was Held Sunday --

The funeral of the late William Kinkaid was held Sunday. The services were in charge of the I.O.O.F. lodge of this city. The Rev. Varney of the Baptist church delivered the funeral sermon. The funeral was one of the largest ever held in the city. There were a great many floral tributes offered.

William Kinkaid was an Idaho pioneer. He first came to Idaho in the early sixties and was one of the first to prospect in the Boise Basin. At that time he was living in Oregon and came to Idaho to work in the mines in the summer and returning home to spend the winters. In 1864 he located in this section and had made his home here ever since. He was one of the most highly respected citizens of the community.

- RUN TO EARTH BY AUTOMOBILE -

William Kinkaid came to his death by being run over and dragged by an automobile driven by John Pipher of Nampa Friday morning last. The accident occurred near the county court house and just after the district court had adjourned for noon. Mr. Kinkaid was a juror in a case that was being tried: While a great many people were about the accident at the time no one actually saw the saw the accident . The evidence presented to the coroner's jury was such as to justify, in its opinion, a complaint of criminal negligence. Mr. Pipher was subsequently arrested on a charge of manslaughter and was admitted to bail.

The evidence showed conclusively that Mr. Pipher was an inexperienced man with an automobile. He tried to turn around on high speed and in order to avoid a telegraph post cut diagonally across the street. He did not see the victim of the accident until too late. Mr. Kinkaid was struck and dragged about 20 feet. His ribs, back bone and both legs were broken.

William Kinkaid went to Wapello with his widowed mother when he was about 7 years old. His mother, Sarah (Glenn) Kinkaid died four years later at that place. She was very sharp, but sometimes got names mixed up. She related that her mother, Lillias Houston Kinkaid died when she was only 7 years old and she lived with an aunt most of the time after that.

Anna Marie's first husband, Jack T. Ringer (1904-1947), was drowned in the Snake river near Clarkston and is buried in Vineland Cemetery in Clarkston. JOHN G. FARRIS, 64, EXPERT ON POWER, DEAD AT REPUBLIC
July 8, 1954

John Gilbert Farris, 64, former Grangeville and Cottonwood power man, died July 8 at Spokane after an operation, it was learned here this week. Farris had made his home at Republic, Wash., for several years.

John Gilbert Farris was born Dec. 1889 at Grangeville. When four years of age he moved with his parents to Clearwater, where he grew to manhood. In Jan. 1911, he married Hazel B. Livingston, a teacher in the Clearwater school. In 1913 the family moved to Grangeville, Idaho, and he became an employee of the Grangeville Light & Water Co., and in 1919 became superintendent for the company at Kamiah. In 1921 he was transferred by his company to Cottonwood as superintendent.

In 1929 he with two associates purchased a power plant at Creston, B.C. Canada, which he operated until 1934, when they sold their interests and he moved to Republic, Wash., a mining town lacking adequate power to operate the mines from the local plant. A new transmission line was built 42 miles connecting with the Washington Water Power Co. at Tonasket, Was., under supervision of Mr. Farris. A new company was formed, Republic Power Company, with the late Eugene Enloe, of Spokane, as president and Mr. Farris as superintendent and manager. In Nov. 1945, the Republic Power Company sold their interests to P.U.D. 1 of Ferry County. In Jan. 1946, Mr. Farris purchased the Tompkins Hardware at Republic, and continued to operate the store until his death July 8, 1954 at Spokane, following an operation. He leaves his wife Hazel B., one son, Ursal G. and one daughter, Mrs. Edna B. Lackey, five grandchildren of Republic, Wash., two sisters, Mrs. Mabel Clark, Kooskia; and Grace Onthank, St. Maries Idaho.

Funeral services were held from Episcopal Church, Republic, Wash., July 12, Rev. Rowland Hills, of Spokane, officiating graveside services by F. & A. M. Burial was in Republic cemetery.
