

TONY

Antonius Michael Kaufmann was the first child of Joseph and Elizabeth Kaufmann to be born in Idaho. He was born June 2, 1902, at the family farm at Greencreek, Idaho, the eighth in the family. When he was four years old, they moved to a farm near Cottonwood, Idaho. Antonius, nicknamed Tony, attended the first seven years of grade school at St. Joseph's parochial school where he was very popular because he always had a smile on his face.

Due to his older brothers having left the farm, Tony early in life inherited a lot of responsibility operating his father's farm. He was adept at handling horses and used them many years in his farming operation. He farmed at Cottonwood until 1921; and then moved to the Tammany county near Lewiston, Idaho, with his parents and continued farming there.

In 1923, Tony went up to Canada and harvested a crop for his father, who had acquired land there from a Mr. Kettenbach. Returning that fall, he worked for his brother Frank on the Salmon River for a while, then he took on a job with the Potlatch Forests for one year. Next he worked for Joe Madden and also farmed some with his brother Ally. About this time he began leasing and buying land for himself. He and his brother leased the scrip farm in Tammany near Lewiston for a time, and then in the mid-1930's the general economy improved to the extent that Tony's farming investments began to produce rewarding results.

Late in the 1930's, Tony met Kathryn Moriarity and soon was dating her regularly. He married her February 19, 1941, at Lewiston, Idaho. They first lived in a home on 18th Avenue; and then a short time later, they moved to the farm in Tammany. In 1945, they bought their present home on Prospect Avenue.

Tony never lost that famous smile of his; and the good Lord blessed him with good judgement, which he has used to good advantage.

Following World War Two, Tony bought several large downtown Lewiston buildings, thus considerably increasing his holdings in real estate. Later in the 1950's and 1960's, the Tony Kaufmanns invested in land and mortgages in the Columbia Basin country in Washington, most of which has given them well earned returns.

Tony and Kathryn enjoy their quiet semi-retirement in their comfortable home at 717 Prospect Avenue in Lewiston, Idaho. They have two children:

LARRY

Laurenzius Johannes Michael Kaufmann, the ninth child of Joseph and Elizabeth Kaufmann, was born June 27, 1904, in the family's farm home near Greencreek, Idaho. He was nicknamed Larry and is known by that name by all of his friends. His youth was spent on their farm at Cottonwood, Idaho, and Larry finished the eighth grade there in St. Joseph's School.

As there was always much music in the Kaufmann home, Larry early in life learned to play the violin, later developing into an excellent violinist while also becoming very adept on the saxophone.

After the family moved away from Cottonwood in the early 1920's, Larry attended Mount Angel College in Oregon for several years studying music. There he became assistant director of the college orchestra. After his college sojourn, he worked for the old R. C. Beach Company in Lewiston, Idaho. He also started his own dance orchestra, and he played violin, saxophone and clarinet.

On June 2, 1929, Larry married Louise Madden, at Lewiston and moved up to Grangeville, Idaho to accept employment as a bartender for Albert Haener. Leaving there, he joined the Phil Sheridan Orchestra playing across the whole country out of Missoula, Montana. Later, in the 1930's, they returned to Lewiston where Larry again conducted his own orchestra and also bought a tavern.

He bought the popular Cottage Tavern from his brother Henry and operated it as well as another tavern at Bovill, Idaho.

Early in the 1940's, the Kaufmanns moved to Tacoma, Washington where Larry worked for the Buffelin Woodworking Company for a few years and there learned the art of making things out of wood. Following the end of the war, Larry moved his family back to Lewiston, where he entered the used car business. Following this enterprise, he worked for his son Ray at Ray's Motorcycle Shop until his retirement at age 70.

The Larry Kaufmanns have a camper and a boat and do much hunting and fishing in their pastime. Larry enjoys his hobbies of woodworking and collecting electric trains. His basement is filled with miniature machinery made from wood to resemble the real machinery he used to see on the farm and elsewhere.

There are also trains of many varieties, all in working order. When Larry turns on all the things that operate, such as wind-mills, pumps, etc., it is an interesting sight.
