New Experiments In Science Dept.

The Science classes, under Mr. Caine, seem to be very busy discovering and learning new things about their particular phases of study.

The biology class has been studying about the plant phylum and the plant world. A special study is also being made of the flora and trees on the Camas Prairie and they are doing several things in pre-paration for field trips later in the

The students taking chemistry are indulging in studying acids, bases, and salts and their physical and chemical properties and the association of these to the electron theory. Their next venture will be in the fields of neutralization, titanium and sonization.

In Physics a detailed study is being made of magnetism, static electricity, and current electricity and their natural phemonena effects on a cathode ray oscillograph. They are studying the relationship and uses of these in modern electricity.

Some new equipment has been added to the department, and has aided the students greatly in their experiments.
