The Grangeville Bulldogs rallied in the last half to defeat the Kendrick Tigers at Kendrick, Saturday Oct. 21, 20-7. Grangeville had already romped over Kendrick 25-0 earlier in the season at Grangeville.

Kendrick opened scoring late in the third quarter. Grangeville got back in the game when Lloyd Ackerman skirted around his own left end for Grangeville's first score. The conversion failed and Kendrick was still ahead 7-6.

Moments later as the fourth quarter opened Ackerman again carried the ball into pay dirt and Grangeville went ahead after the conversion was made 13-6.

After Kendrick fumbled deep in their own territory and a Grangeville recovery, Grangeville, led by Glenn Johnson and Archie Gilcrist scored again for the final score, 20-7. Play ended with Grangeville threatening for another touchdown with the ball on Kendrick's eleven yard line.
